Hardwood cherry cabinets envelop an expansive window in the open-concept kitchen, while bathroom fixtures and faucets flash a gleam that only a newly minted home can wear. The new construction build in the Sumerset Neighborhood of Ann Arbor holds all the makings of a custom builder, complete with Merrilat Cabinetry, Delta Faucets and a fresh coat of Behr paint on every wall. Only the hands that built this home were those of high school students.

Now marking its 42nd home, the Ann Arbor Student Building Industry Program (AASBIP) teaches the next generation of builders and tradespeople the literal and figurative tools needed to construct residential homes. According to the program, students participate in every phase of the homebuilding process from developing raw land to putting on the finishing touches with paint and trim. Not only does the program provide unique learning opportunities through hands-on experiences, it also teaches practical uses of math and business skills while students learn how to work collaboratively in a team to execute a successful job.

"We're so impressed with the students," says Melonie Colaianne, president of the Masco Corporation Foundation. Masco Corporation, one of the world's largest manufacturers of brand-name consumer products in the home improvement and new construction industry, has been a corporate contributor of the program for two years. Masco contributed Merrilat Cabinetry, Milgard Windows, Behr Paint, and Delta Faucets and accessories to AASBIP's 2010 to 2011 home.

With a corporate citizen creed emphasizing housing initiatives, Masco's partnership with AASBIP seems a natural fit. Melonie notes that it is students in programs such as AASBIP that will be leaders in building the homes of the future. The result is a stunning work of craftsmanship presented by students learning the profession firsthand with some of the biggest brand names in the business.

Featuring quality products such as KraftMaid, Merillat, and QualityCabinets, Masco Cabinetry relocated to Ann Arbor Township in 2010 and has made a true impact on the local community through their support of AASBIP and other local initiatives.

In partnership with its foundation, Masco recently helped celebrate Habitat for Humanity of Huron Valley's 100th home in Washtenaw County by donating funds, time and materials including windows, insulation and bathroom fixtures.
